# **"ALWAYS IN BLOOM"** A Special Memorial Hall Opening celebrated **ArtWeek**

PVMA opened Memorial Hall Museum's 138<sup>th</sup> season with a botanical twist! PVMA was a proud official **ArtWeek** host, one of 500 cultural organizations across the state joining together in celebrating the arts in Massachusetts. PVMA offered free admission to all during opening weekend May 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup>. Special hands -on activities included a floral-themed museum scavenger hunt and an array of free art activities for adults and children.



According to PVMA **ArtWeek** Coordinator Sheila Damkoehler, "We were delighted to kick off our 2018 season with a weekend-long event engaging all the senses! Although primarily a history museum, Memorial Hall also houses a large collection of works by local artists and fine craftspeople. With so many exquisite fine and decorative arts pieces in our museum collection bearing floral designs, a botanical theme immediately came to mind for our first participation in **ArtWeek**. It was a great opportunity to bring to the public's attention our art collection as well as our staff's enthusiasm and creative talent for art, music, and flowers!"

The botanical theme will carry through the season with the free museum scavenger hunt. An eco-print workshop is planned for October 13, when Old Deerfield Craft Fairs' artist Martha Simpson will lead participants through the process of transferring color from a variety of leaves and berries onto silk cloth. Visitors to Memorial Hall Museum can see examples of Martha's work on display this season — a modern-day blending of art, nature, and science — along-side early botanist Orra White Hitchcock's reproduction herbarium. Completed in 1821, the herbarium features paintings of Franklin County flora, and is on display in the recently installed "Astronomy, Geology, and Dino Tracks! Oh my!" exhibit about Edward and Orra Hitchcock and early natural sciences.
